





OUR COMMUNITY...

Located just 20 miles from Schenectady and Albany and with easy access via Interstate 88 to other nearby cities such as Troy and Saratoga Springs, the close proximity to educational, cultural, social and outdoor activities makes Duanesburg a suitable place for families to settle.



The Duanesburg Central School District, serving more than 800 students in grades K-12, consists of two buildings: The Duanesburg Elementary School, which educates students in grades K-5, and the Duanesburg Middle/High School, which serves students in grades 6-8 (MS) and 9-12 (HS).



HOMETOWN SCHOOL DISTRICT

- DCS is consistently recognized as a high-performing district with a high return on investment. It has one of the highest graduation rates in the region (in the 90s), and is dedicated to preparing students for college, the workplace and life by offering a robust academic program designed to promote lifelong learning and personal development. The percentage of graduates who pursue a post-secondary education is regularly in the 90s.
- In addition to the traditional academic courses, the district proudly offers Advanced Placement Courses, University in High School courses where students earn college credits, distance learning courses and a variety of 21st-century elective courses such as forensic science, industrial design, website development, television production, international business, life in the ER, and introduction to nanotechnology, to name a few.
- For the district is also home to many talented students who participate in music and art, with many students annually scoring "outstanding" or "excellent" in the NYSSMA Festival and earning statewide recognition for their artwork.
- Duanesburg students can participate in more than a dozen clubs devoted to many different interest areas—from community service to the arts and sciences.
- The district's athletic program has more than 10 teams from which to choose, and Varsity teams often qualify and play in sectional and state competitions.
- The district is 21-century ready with nearly every classroom equipped with one or more computers and projectors connected to a secure wireless network. Many classrooms have interactive Whiteboards and there are seven computer labs between the two buildings as well as two mobile netbook carts.



RICH LOCAL HISTORY

The Town of Duanesburg was proudly named in honor of Judge James Duane, the chief proprietor of the town in 1765, who played a major role in the American Revolution as a founding father of our republic. Duane was also the first mayor of New York City, a federal district court judge, a member of the First Provincial Congress and also helped found the New York State government and its constitution.

- For those interested in local history, the Town of Duanesburg has over forty national registry structures including Federal, Greek Revival, Italianate, octagonal, Victorian and saltbox architectural styles, contains 643 structures identified as historic by New York State, 55 cemeteries and 15 natural sites of interest.
- Episcopal Church and the Quaker Meeting House. The Christ Episcopal Church, consecrated in 1793, was given as a place of worship by James Duane to the people of Duanesburg. It is considered to be the oldest Episcopal Church in New York State that still stands in the "quaint" simplicity of its original structure. The Quaker Meeting House, built in 1807 by an early settlement of Quakers, has been in continuous use since it was first opened. The building, in the hamlet of Quaker Street, still embodies the spirit of simplicity and plainness of the Society of Friends.

SHOPPING & ENTERTAINMENT

There's something for everyone in

Duanesburg and its surrounding towns

- Seasonal berry and apple picking; local, organic farm markets and shops such as Schoharie Valley Carrot Farm, Mildred's Meadows, Apple Barrel, Syron's Fresh Meat Market and Hickory Hill Smokehouse as well as lots of antique shopping attract people locally and from afar.
- There are many annual community happenings, such as the Memorial Day Parade, Fourth of July Fireworks, the DACC Triathlon, the Village Trick or Treating event, and the Canadian Pacific Railways Holiday Train that stops in the Village of Delanson where residents participate in outdoor activities to kick off the start of the holiday season.
- For residents' shopping convenience there's a Hannaford Supermarket and Pharmacy in town, and Rotterdam Square, Colonie Center and Crossgates Malls are just a short distance.
- Duaneburg is also just a stone's throw to many historical, entertainment venues such as Howe Caverns with its underground wonders and the Baseball Hall of Fame, the Farmers Museum and Fenimore Art Museum in Cooperstown.
- Duanesburg also supports many religions and is home to a variety of churches—some historical, such as the Our Lady of Fatima Church and Shrine and the Christ Episcopal Church.
